### **Classroom Behavior and Rules:**

\*This applies only to the rules specified above and other Class 1 Offenses as defined in the student planner. Class 2, 3 or 4 offenses will receive an immediate referral. <u>Grading Scale</u> Students will be graded on a <u>percentage system</u>. We use a variety of tools to assess learning of the curriculum. All tests, quizzes, and projects are posted in advance. A student's grade will be based on the following elements:

- 1. 60% Tests/Projects/Essays
- 2. 30% Assignments
- 3. 10% Weekly Bell ringers

**End of Course Exam:** A student's performance on the statewide-administered Civics EOC Assessment must constitute **30 percent** of the student's final course grade. Baseline data will be collected to establish a minimum passing score on the Civics EOC Assessment.

# Civics Class Student Service Learning Component:

Each student will be required to complete a total of 4 *hours of Student Service Learning during each semester period*. More information to come. *SS.7.C.2.14* 

### Attendance:

Students learn best when they are attending school every day. When a student is missing school, they are missing out on daily lessons and other important skills which they need to be successful in school and in life. Being present for school every day will also instill a sense of responsibility within a student which will help them later in life as well. Students are expected to be in class every day prepared and ready to participate in that day's activity.

### Make-up Work:

Make-up work is the student's responsibility. On the day of the students return, the student should check the planner board for missed assignments. Assignments are posted daily on the assignment board, as well as my website, which must be recorded in the student's planner. I expect students to take pre-announced test/quizzes on the day of his/her return. For everyday of an excused absence, you have 2 days to make-up work. Do not get behind on missed assignments. Late work will be accepted with point deduction, however late work beyond one week of the due date will not be accepted. All ESE/504/ESOL student accommodations will be provided within the classroom.

# Extra Credit:

Some opportunities for extra credit may be offered throughout the year. However, <u>do not expect extra credit</u> to be offered at the end of the grading period to replace assignments that should have already been <u>completed.</u> Please stay caught up with assignments throughout the grading period.

### **Student Planner:**

The planner is a communication tool used to help our students stay focused on their goals and commitments. Your success in keeping an orderly assignment log will help you with time management, goal setting, and monitoring your progress and growth. It is also a critical tool for communication between school and home. All assignments should be recorded in this planner. Information in the planner section of the board in the classroom should be recorded in the planner. It should be written in the social studies section of the planner. The planner is also used to leave the room as your hall passes are located in it. We will have routine planner checks for accuracy and condition of the planner. Be prepared, keep it updated.
